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SD-1 Status of Librarians at Peer and Cross Applicant Institutions

A survey of peer and cross applicant institutions was conducted in May-June 2005 with questions regarding the faculty status of librarians. 26 institutions responded.

Do librarians have faculty status at your institution?

- Yes 50%
- Yes, but not eligible for some faculty benefits 12%
- Some do and some do not 12%
- No 27%

Are librarian positions tenure track?

- Yes 31%
- No 69%

Are librarian positions at your institution ranked?

- Yes 58%
- No 42%

SD-2 Benefits of Librarians at Peer and Cross Applicant Institutions

A survey of peer and cross applicant institutions was conducted in May-June 2005 with questions regarding the faculty status of librarians and benefits available. 26 institutions responded, of which 13 answered an unqualified “yes” when asked if all librarians there have faculty status. The first column below reflects the benefits available to librarians at all 26 institutions that responded to the survey. The second column includes only the 13 that answered “yes” to whether or not all librarians have faculty status. Benefits are listed in order by the number of institutions at which they are offered.
